Information for patients who have had general anaesthesia for dental treatment

After your general anaesthesia (GA) for dental treatment

- You should rest at home for at least the next 24 hours.
- As a result of the anaesthetic procedure you may have a sore/ bleeding nose, a sore throat and some pain or stiffness in the muscles around your back and chest. This should slowly settle.
- Any bleeding should have stopped by the time you leave the hospital, although a little 'oozing' is common.
- Local anaesthetic is often used in the mouth at the time of the anaesthetic so take care not to bite your tongue, lips or cheeks whilst they are numb. The numbness usually disappears by the time you leave the hospital.
- The dentist sometimes puts 'surgicel' in the tooth socket to help stop any bleeding, this will look like a brown gauze or cotton wool like material. It may fall out, or if it stays in the socket it simply disappears on its own in a few days.

FOR AT LEAST 24 HOURS AFTER THE ANAESTHETIC

THE PATIENT MUST NOT:

- Be left alone
- Look after children or dependant adults
- Return to work
- Drive a car or ride a bike
- Drink alcohol or smoke tobacco
- Do any strenuous exercise, i.e. sports, cycling or carrying heavy bags
- Operate machinery, including gas/electric cookers and kettles
- Make important decisions or sign legal documents
- Take recreational drugs

If you had teeth removed

On the day:

- Do not rinse your mouth, just gently spit out any blood
- Do not eat any hard food. Also avoid food like rice for a few days as the small particles may fall into the tooth socket. We recommend soft foods e.g. pasta, mashed potato, sandwiches, yogurt and ice-cream. Avoid big heavy meals.
- To prevent dehydration ensure you drink regularly. Food and drink should be warm or cold, NOT HOT.
- You may take painkillers as prescribed, or advised by the dentist, such as paracetamol and / or ibuprofen. DO NOT take aspirin.
- Do not hold anything hot on the outside of your face.

If bleeding starts again

- 1. Sit in an upright position
- Fold a gauze pack and press it onto the area where the blood is coming from
- 3. Close your teeth together onto the pack for 10 minutes

After 24 hours

Make and use a hot salt water mouthwash as instructed below:

- 1. Add 1 teaspoon of salt to 1/2 a mug of hot (not scalding) water
- 2. Take a mouthful of the hot salty water and count to 15 slowly before spitting it out
- 3. Repeat step 2 until you have used up all the hot salty water

This should be done at least twice a day for 3 days.

Keep the rest of your mouth clean by gentle but thorough tooth brushing.
